

#### # WITSIES4LIFE





Ninety-two-year-old **Dr Libby** Lashansky(MBBCh 1954) was profiled in *The* Washington Post about her life as a diabetic – a diagnosis she received as a child. Before insulin was discovered to help diabetics in 1921, children who developed Type 1 diabetes had an average life expectancy of only three years after they were diagnosed. This great-grandmother has outlived the doctors who told her she would die young.


